

Welcome!

Now entering its fifth year, **Get Outdoors (GO) Lebanon!** continues to encourage Lebanon County children and families to read and be physically active during the summer months. This summer, **WellSpan Health** and **Lebanon County Libraries** are excited to partner in encouraging you to **GO and Find Your Story!** That story



may be something you read, something you do, something you learn or something you discover - it's your story. Stories connect us. They engage our spirit, spur our imagination, and help us explore our dreams. Stories enliven our existence. They help us discover other stories, learn about other people, and open up a world of possibilities. Amazing things happen when people connect with others and the world of reading, writing and storytelling allows

connections to happen. As you venture through this summer's program, look for your story and share it with others along the way.

This summer, **GO Lebanon!** helps you explore many stories and introduces you to folk tales, mythology and fantasy while you search for fifteen "story pages" - wooden marker posts with a unique etching attached - that are hidden in various local and state parks. Take this **Storybook**, along with the rubbing sheet you received at any **Lebanon County Library** and **GO and Find Your Story!**

When you find the story page, you will see the unique etching, along with a 4-digit code. **Make sure you remember this code** (take a picture, write it down, etc.) and don't forget to enter it into the **Beanstack** app to earn credit for your hike. If you choose to do the rubbing on your rubbing sheet, please be sure

to follow social distancing practices and sanitize your hands afterward. Rubbing sheets will not be collected this year, so they are yours to keep. But remember - to receive credit for your hikes, **you must enter the codes online in the Beanstack app**. See the **Rewards and Prizes** page in this book (p. 24) for details. Also, don't forget to check out the **GO Lebanon!** website at www.golebcounty.org for additional information including recommended library books, story nuggets, outdoor safety tips, and more.

In addition to "finding story pages," you can **Find Your Story!** by visiting any **Lebanon County Library**, checking out and reading a few books about dragons, mermaids, leprechauns and unicorns. Reading this summer will grow your reading and learning abilities. Come visit a **Lebanon County Library** to get your Summer Quest materials and start earning points toward great prizes! What is Letterboxing?

GO and Find your Story! is based on the outdoor hobby of letterboxing. Hikers once hid letters or postcards in a box along a trail. The next person to find the box would then collect and mail those postcards. Today, people leave a unique stamp and logbook in letterboxes. The finder then stamps their personal logbook and also leaves their own personal stamp, if they have one. Again, this year, we are using a unique picture located on a post that you must rub to record your find.

Things to Remember:

Every outdoor activity, including letterboxing, has some risks and dangers. You could get hurt, meet up with wild animals and bugs, and touch poisonous plants. Here are a few reminders as you hunt for story pages with other **GO Lebanon!** kids this summer:

- ❖ Be familiar with the area where you are headed before getting there!
- ❖ Make sure to follow all posted park rules.
- ❖ Be respectful of the environment and of others around you!
- ❖ Never hike alone! If you are heading out with a friend, always make sure a responsible adult knows where you will be.
- ❖ Always lock your vehicle and secure any valuables.
- ❖ Wear clothing that is loose-fitting, light-weight, and light-colored to protect your skin from the sun and to keep you cool.
- ❖ Lather up with sunscreen - keep your skin healthy for years to come!
- ❖ Bring plenty of water with you and make sure you drink it even if you don't feel thirsty.
- ❖ If it is really hot outside, bring extra water, walk slower, and take more breaks.
- ❖ Seek safe shelter if the weather gets dangerous, or you hear or see storms nearby.
- ❖ Step carefully over and around fallen logs and branches, rocks, roots, and other things lying on the ground.
- ❖ Poisonous plants - poison ivy, poison oak, or poison sumac - may grow near a story page or along a trail. Know what each looks like and watch out for them!
- ❖ Spiders, insects, snakes, or other critters may visit the same places where story pages are hidden. Be careful where you step and where you reach!
- ❖ Mosquitoes, black flies, or other annoying bugs may bother you. Make sure to wear bug repellent spray or other products to keep them away.
- ❖ Always check to make sure that you are not taking any bugs home with you.
- ❖ Be careful around ponds, lakes, rivers and streams. Don't swim alone!

Finding GO Lebanon! Story Pages:


- 📖 One book = It's easy. You must walk a short distance on fairly level ground.
- 📖📖 Two books = It's a little harder. You must either walk a long distance on fairly level ground, or a short distance with some hills.
- 📖📖📖 Three books = It's tough. You must walk a long distance with many hills and obstacles.

Distances to all story pages were measured using a standard smart phone app. All distances are roundtrip, unless otherwise noted, based on following the clues as written from starting point to the post and backtracking to the starting point.

- ❖ From the parking lot, walk away from the Environmental Center and past the benches on the hill.
- ❖ Follow the trail into the woods then turn left at your first intersection and follow the yellow blazes.
- ❖ Turn right at the gravel road and continue uphill.
- ❖ Turn left at the third trail intersection and follow trail #2 marked with red blazes.
- ❖ The post you seek is just beyond the steep gravel trail and fence.
- ❖ To return to your vehicle, turn around and retrace your steps.
- ❖ To explore the tower, follow the steep unmarked trail on your right. The tower is at the top of the hill.
- ❖ To return from the tower, follow the gravel Fire Road near the open meadow and continue downhill.
- ❖ Follow the signs for the Environmental Center to arrive at the parking lot.


- ❖ From the parking lot, walk toward the school and building with orange garage doors.

- ❖ Turn left after blue park sign and continue past the flags and first tan building.
- ❖ Follow the trail past the playground and baseball field.
- ❖ The post you seek is near the wooden fence.
- ❖ To return, continue in your current direction.

- ❖ Turn right at wooden post and follow the gravel trail.
- ❖ Cross the wooden bridge near the parking lot and continue on the trail.
- ❖ Follow the trail past the next parking lot and boat launch.
- ❖ Stay to the left of the wood logs to remain on the trail.
- ❖ The post you seek is beyond the bench near the lake.
- ❖ To return to your vehicle, continue in your current direction.



- ❖ Follow the trail to the left and then follow the gravel trail away from the pond.
- ❖ The post you seek is near the green gate.
- ❖ To return to your vehicle, turn left past the gate and continue in the grass near the chain link fence.

- ❖ Turn right at the tan building and follow the guardrail along the parking lot.
- ❖ Turn left before the trail entrance and continue following the guardrail down the hill and along the road.
- ❖ Turn right after the creek and follow the paved trail near the park sign.
- ❖ The post you seek is near the second bridge.
- ❖ To return to your vehicle, continue in your current direction.
- ❖ Carefully cross the street and then follow the road back to the parking lot.



- ❖ At 9th and Cumberland Streets traffic light, carefully cross the street and walk past Rent-A-Center heading north on 9th Street.
- ❖ Turn right at Willow Street and continue to traffic light at 7th Street.
- ❖ Carefully cross 7th Street and then Willow Street.
- ❖ Continue north on 7th Street and walk past the library and toward the YMCA.
- ❖ After the waterway bridge, turn right and follow the Born Learning Trail.
- ❖ Turn right onto 5th Street and continue south to Cumberland Street.
- ❖ Turn right at Domino's and continue west on Cumberland Street until you reach Wells Fargo.
- ❖ Turn left onto 8th Street and walk south toward the Farmers Market.
- ❖ The etching you seek is near Visit Lebanon Valley. (**Note - The etching plate is attached to a building. There is no post at this location.**)
- ❖ To return to vehicle, turn around and make your first left at the alley.
- ❖ Continue past the building to arrive at parking lot.

- ❖ The post you seek is near the park bench.
- ❖ To return to your vehicle, continue in your current direction and make a quick right.
- ❖ Follow the paved trail uphill and back to the parking lot.


- ❖ A magic lamp is an oil lamp that can be rubbed in order to summon a genie who grants wishes.

- ❖ Turn left at baseball field then turn right at next trail intersection.
- ❖ The post you seek is near the chain link fence.
- ❖ To return, continue in your current direction.



- ❖ Turn right and follow the trail across the bridge.
- ❖ At the parking lot, locate the trail at the bottom of the hill past the wooden sign and trash can.
- ❖ Follow the trail through the woods to an open clearing near the lake. The post you seek is near the top of the hill.
- ❖ To return to your vehicle, turn around and retrace your steps.



- ❖ Continue following the trail alongside the lake.
- ❖ Carefully cross the driveway and continue straight on the trail.
- ❖ Turn left after the Veteran's Garden.
- ❖ Continue past the soccer fields where you will find the post you seek.
- ❖ To return to your vehicle, continue in your current direction.
- ❖ Turn right at the trail intersection and follow the trail to the parking lot.

- ❖ From the parking lot, locate the orange and brown Conservation Trail in the field.
- ❖ Follow the trail uphill and to the left.
- ❖ Continue following the signs for Conservation Trail.
- ❖ At the meadow, turn right to remain on Conservation Trail and continue to follow the trail signs.
- ❖ The post you seek is along the boardwalk.
- ❖ To return to your vehicle, continue in your current direction.
- ❖ Stay left at the intersection and continue downhill.
- ❖ Cross over several boardwalks and a wooden bridge.
- ❖ Continue to follow the trail signs then turn left and walk uphill to return to the parking lot.

- ❖ To return to your vehicle, turn around and retrace your steps.



- ❖ Stay straight at the trail intersection and continue toward the baseball fields.
- ❖ Follow the trail to the right before the playground. The post you seek is nearby.
- ❖ To return to your vehicle, continue in the same direction walking past the pavilions and tennis courts.



- ❖ It was believed for the longest time that witchcraft was mostly a female activity. But there are male counterparts of witches as well, mostly referred to as wizards, warlocks or sorcerers.

- ❖ The post you seek is just beyond the tunnel.
- ❖ To return to your vehicle, turn around and retrace your steps.

Story Nuggets:

- ❖ Wolves live in family groups called packs made up of a male parent, a female parent and usually some of their pups over the previous years. Pack sizes range from three to twenty wolves.
- ❖ Wolves help feed other animals in the ecosystem. Carrion feeders and other scavengers like eagles, bears and crows eat the remains left by wolves. The remains of kills left by wolves often help many species survive hard winters.
- ❖ Wolves can roam large and long distances, sometimes up to 12 miles (20 kilometers) in a single day. Wolves prefer to eat large animals like deer, elk, and moose. One wolf can eat 20 pounds (9 kilograms) of meat at a single sitting.





Congratulations! You've found one of the 15 story pages! Now you can digitally track your progress (and unlock virtual badges!) on **Beanstack**. You'll need your rubbing sheet nearby to complete logging.

Follow these steps to track your progress on **Beanstack**:

1. Open your Beanstack Tracker app and log in.
2. Register for SummerQuest if you have not yet done so.
 - a. Tap the **Discover** icon from the bottom of the screen
 - b. Find the **SummerQuest** program for your age and tap the **Register** button.
3. Tap the blue + (plus) button at the bottom of the screen to add to your log. Next, tap the **Activity** icon.
4. If you have multiple readers on one account, you should then select the name of the person you would like to log the activity for, and press **Choose Reader**.
5. The list of available activities will then appear, based on the SummerQuest program your child is enrolled in. Tap the activity named **GO Lebanon**!



6. Scroll to find the name of the story page you just found. Using your rubbing sheet, find the secret code for this story page below the rubbing. Enter the secret code and **save** your answer.



7. Points and badges will be awarded to you as you identify more story pages!


